DOUBT NO LONGER BUT BELIEVE



Two days after the death of Jesus. The disciples are inside the house with the doors firmly locked. scared that, as companions of Jesus, they too will be arrested and killed. The next moment. Jesus is standing in their midst. The very fact that he can be present in spite of the locked doors indicates that Jesus is somehow different - that he's present in a new way. His greeting is the normal Jewish greeting of Shalom, but, coming from Jesus - the Prince of Peace - to this group of frightened people, it has special meaning. Where Jesus is truly present to us, there is peace. He shows them his hands and side. He is not just a disembodied ghost, but the same Jesus who died on the cross and yet there are differences. The disciples' fear is gradually transformed into an indescribable joy at Jesus' return. He repeats his greeting of peace, and then gives them their mission to be agents of reconciliation and peace. He breathes on them and gives them his Holy Spirit. With this gift, the

disciples' he commissions them to bring about the reconciliation of all people with God - with their brothers and sisters and with the whole of crea-

tion. This is no small ask. In practice, it involves a lot more than just saying words of forgiveness. It involves much more than 'going to confession' and being absolved by a priest. It involves working concretely to create a society based on right relationships. This, is the making of the Kingdom of God. And, of course, this is our mission too. The words of Jesus spoken to them are also spoken to us. As we think about the unresolved and violent crisis in both Gaza and Ukraine we are challenged to be people of peace in our own small way trusting that God can magnify our actions and influence what is happening on the other side of the world.

There is a second part to this gospel account. On that first Easter, there was one apostle missing – Thomas. When he was told that his companions had seen the Lord, he stated that he would not believe unless he saw with his own eyes Christ's wounds. A week later, those same disciples, including Thomas, gathered together in the room. Although the doors were locked, Jesus was suddenly

there among them. After greeting them with peace, he invited Thomas not just to look, but to touch the wounds saying: Do not doubt but believe. Thomas yields completely to the experience saying, My Lord and my God! This statement is one of the most powerful acknowledgements of Jesus' real identity in the whole Gospel and the only time anyone directly calls him God - it is a powerful act of faith. Thomas could not see directly that Jesus was God. No one can see God directly. But the experience convinced Thomas that he was in the presence of God himself. (cont)

Lastly, Jesus' words are meant to encourage us: Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe. For our part, we need to be always open to those experiences where God's Tui Motu Group unmistakable presence can be recognised. Finally, we are reminded that everything that is in the Gospel is to help us to come to that stage of faith by which we believe: that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing [we] may have life in his name. Untold numbers of people have tried this and found that it is altogether true. They have found in following Christ, a meaning, a direction and a very special quality to their lives which cannot be found anywhere else. May that be your experience too. May that be our experience!

Go and transform our world by your lives. Doubt no longer but believe!

THANK YOU to everyone who contributed to make our Easter celebrations such a wonderful experience of faith and life. There were many moments where I felt uplifted and delighted to be a Catholic Christian, commemorating the life and death of Jesus and then celebrating his resurrection. Alleluia! Following on from my request for nominations for a new Parish Council, we are making progress and I will keep you updated. One aspect of our parish life currently missing is a social life.
